The Absolute Equality-Juneteenth Mural Project aims to recontextualize Juneteenth as a pivotal moment in the arc of U.S. history while properly telling the story of its genesis, and historical, and contemporary relevance.










Juneteenth commemorates the freedom of more than 250,000 enslaved Black people in the state of Texas. Juneteenth is now observed as a national holiday annually on June 19, celebrating the emancipation of those enslaved in the United States.

Juneteenth, also known as Freedom Day, commemorates the abolition of slavery in the United States. It is celebrated on June 19th, the day in 1865 when Major Gordon Granger and over 2000 Black Union soldiers arrived in Texas and announced that all enslaved Blacks in Texas were free. It is considered the oldest known celebration of the end of slavery in the United States.








Following the unveiling of the Absolute Equality-Juneteenth mural in Galveston, Texas, and the national recognition of Juneteenth as a holiday in June 2021, Reginald C. Adams conceived a nationwide initiative. Absolute Equality-Juneteenth Mural Project reimagines an approach to public art, monuments, and memorials, while shedding light on the historical significance of Juneteenth and promoting a more inclusive representation of our nation's diverse heritage.

Through the Absolute Equality-Juneteenth Mural Project, we bring to life the compelling narrative of emancipation and liberty, celebrating the vibrant tapestry that is Juneteenth, an influential and essential chapter of American history. In 2022, we produced the Shreveport and Miami Absolute Equality murals.

In Miami's historic Overton community we produced a mural on the exterior wall of Jackson's Soul Food Restaurant.

Capital One Ambassadors, volunteers, and local community members came together to help, artist/designer Jason Jones, paint a mural that celebrates the diversity and resilience of the African American community along with the heritage of Juneteenth.

This was a great example of how we are putting the public in public art.



Host Sites

The host sites for the 2023 Absolute Equality-Juneteenth murals hold immense historical significance. Each location represents a pivotal chapter in the African American experience and the fight for freedom. From the African American History Research Center, located in Houston's historic Freedmen's Town, to Miami's Paul L. Dunbar K-8 Center located in the heart of Wynwood's artistic district, these sites embody the intersection of culture and history. Dallas, Detroit, Philadelphia, Shreveport, and Chicago's murals also symbolize their cities' deep connections to the Juneteenth narrative, while Galveston stands as the birthplace of Juneteenth itself.

Together, these murals form a powerful tapestry celebrating African American heritage and resilience, inviting the world to experience the rich legacy of Juneteenth.

The host cities selected for the proposed 2024 Absolute Equality-Juneteenth murals carry profound historical significance in the context of African American heritage and the struggle for freedom.
